



# CURRICULUM UPDATE

Child Development Centers, Inc. utilizes a formal, purchased curriculum called The Creative Curriculum. It contains early learning objectives that are subdivided into 10 categories including sense of self, responsibility for self and others, pro-social behavior, large motor skills, small motor skills, learning and problem-solving, logical thinking, mathematics, representation and symbolic thinking, listening and speaking, and reading and writing.

The Creative Curriculum balances student-led with teacher-led questions, investigations and explorations. During a Study, such as Trees, the classroom is transformed into a learning community, which generates questions and finds ways to explore those questions. The children discuss the Question of the Day, participate in the Read-Aloud Book protocol, work in small groups with the Intentional Teaching Cards across the curriculum, and engage in the Mighty Minutes for playful learning, as well as for transitions. In addition, the Study-based materials are integrated across the Interest Areas for informal exploration by the children.



- Increase in the number of Venango/Crawford County teachers receiving a perfect score on their overall performance within the curriculum.
- A curated preschool research base was established with emphasis on the work of Lev Vygotsky, which is characteristic of all high-quality preschools in the country and around the world.
- Nine preschool teacher trainings were released to teachers for high quality practices in preschool, including child-made play plans, teachers planning intentional play and transformed dramatic play.
- Five teacher trainings were designed for Infant/Toddler Studies.
- A training for the CDC preschool writing program was finished with a companion resource, A CDC Teacher Guide: Writing in Preschool.
  - A preschool teacher training for Vygotsky-based Interest Areas was designed with a companion resource, A CDC Teacher Guide: Vygotsky-based Activities for the Interest Areas.
  - All trainings designed for infant/toddler and preschool teachers include a strong, intentional Social-Emotional component proven by research to grow those skills in children and to diminish behaviors.
  - The on-staff Curriculum Specialist was trained on the Classroom Assessment Scoring System (CLASS) in order to apply the dimensions to Creative Curriculum and to focus especially on the instructional format.
  - Ten CDC Infant/Toddler Studies were designed and implemented. The Studies include Spring, Summer, Fall, Winter, Sticky Things, Roads and Streets, Bugs, Boxes, Balls and Animals.
  - A toddler's book list was compiled for each infant/toddler study.
  - A thorough analysis was conducted of Teaching Strategies Gold, the system used to track student achievement progress, to identify findings that will help teachers tailor the children's learning.
  - Head Start take-home activities were designed for 11 Creative Curriculum studies and Beginning the Year (children's orientation phase of the school year).

# FUTURE PLANS FOR SCHOOL YEAR 2020-2021:

As Child Development Centers, Inc. enters the 2020-2021 school term, our goal is to begin implementing some of the new resources we have been working on over the past year, including the Preschool Writing Program and take-home parent activities aligned to the curriculum.

Additionally, we will incorporate the research on intentional play in Vygotsky-based Interest Areas and work to ensure accurate placement of children.

Lastly, we have a goal of utilizing research-proven activities and instruction strategies to grow children's social-emotional skills in preparation for the transition to kindergarten.

# PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Child Development Centers, Inc. began using the Learning Management System (LMS) to provide professional development courses and trainings for staff. Since the creation of the first course in July 2019, 60 courses have been created with 9,505 completions. There are 418 active CDC users divided into 21 different teams (based on locations or departments).

#### Top 5 courses include:

- Personnel Policies
- CACFP Guidelines
- Infectious Disease/Pandemic Protocol
- Emergency Plan Training
- Attendance Matters

Future plans for LMS trainings include "15-Minute Hot-Shots," which will be quick (15 minutes or less) "back to basics" trainings using narratives, pictures, video clips, etc. designed to deliver brief but impactful information.

One vital component of our mission of "Educating Children to Succeed" is keeping children healthy. Our Health Services Team led by Dr. Scott Cartwright, board-certified pediatrician, works closely with our families and center staff to ensure a healthy learning environment. This year nearly 100% of medical exams, vision and hearing screenings in our Head Start programs were completed in Crawford, Erie and Venango counties prior to the COVID-19 closure. Other significant accomplishments include:

- Dental exams were provided for the majority of our Head Start students through a local dentist and approximately 100 children agency wide were referred for further dental care.
- Fluoride varnish was provided to many children prior to the COVID-19 closure.
- All CDC employees received the influenza vaccination free of charge.
- The Health Services team is working with Human Resources to ensure all CDC employees are vaccinated for Tdap.
- Tdap and MMR clinics were established with Rite Aid to vaccinate well over 100+ employees for MMR to insure excellent protection of our staff and children against the measles. This initiative saved an estimate of over \$15,000 for CDC and it's employees. Currently less than 10 employees still need vaccinated for MMR which will be provided free of cost by CDC.
- We successfully re-opened six DHS centers in the midst of the pandemic with strict COVID-19 protocols.

 CDC received state and national recognition for the implementation of our innovative COVID-19 safety protocols that were created by the Health Services team.

- Our Speech therapist team has created, and formatted CDC's entire speech curriculum, including Speech cards to assist teachers in the classroom.
- Developed employee education and training resources on health related topics such as speech, employee wellness and COVID-19 prevention.





"We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Child Development Centers, Inc., which comprise the statements of financial position as of June 30, 2019 and 2018, and the related statements of activities and changes in net assets, functional expenses and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Child Development Centers, Inc. as of June 30, 2019 and 2018, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

As described in Note B to the financial statements, during the 2019 year-end, Child Development Centers, Inc. adopted new accounting guidance, FASB Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2016-14, Not-for-Profit Entities (Topic 958) - Presentation of Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Entities. Our opinion is not modified with respect to this matter.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated November 27, 2019, on our consideration of Child Development Centers, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters.

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Child Development Centers, Inc.'s financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under Government Auditing Standards."





# FUTURE GROWTH/EXPANSION
